



Instructions

Rising high school juniors and seniors may apply for Dual Enrollment Admission to UNC Wilmington for the purpose of taking courses not offered at their high school. Applications are reviewed on a case-by-case basis. There is no application fee; however students are responsible for paying all associated tuition and fees at the point of registration. An enrollment deposit of \$100 is required before a student can register for his or her first UNCW class; beyond that there is no additional deposit for each dual enrollment class term.

The Office of Admissions does not guarantee enrollment in the classes listed on the application; students will register themselves for requested classes upon acceptance. Students may only register for two undergraduate courses per term (6 credit hours). If a student is interested in taking more than two undergraduate courses they must receive special permission from UNCW and their high school.

Applications for Dual Enrollment are valid for one semester only. A new application must be submitted for each additional semester that you wish to take UNC Wilmington classes.

Eligibility for Dual Enrollment

To be eligible for dual enrollment at UNC Wilmington each student must:

- Meet the Minimum Course Requirements of The University of North Carolina, except senior English and a fourth year of Math.
- Students must have a minimum cumulative weighted GPA of 3.50
- Students must have a SAT score of 1100 or higher on the Critical Reading and Math sections, or a 24 composite score on the ACT with Writing section

You must submit the following materials by the deadlines stated below:

- Completed and signed UNC Wilmington application for Dual Enrollment, which includes signed permission from your high school counselor or designated school official with approved course selections.
- Official high school transcript.
- Official SAT or ACT with writing test scores.

Please submit these application materials together. They must be received by the deadlines listed below for your Dual Enrollment application to be considered. *Late applications will not be accepted.*

Spring: November 1

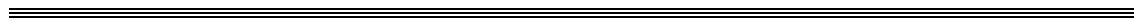
